

#### PRESIDENT'S MESSAGE



Thank you to **Tracey** for fulfilling the President's role so brilliantly for the last three years. Our Constitution restricts the term of a Presidency to three years, so I am back again for a year.

Our five year Memorandum of Understanding with Lismore City Council has been renewed and was signed by me and the General Manager of LCC at our end of year party for the volunteers in December, to which the General Manager and waste facility staff were invited. The MOU was also accompanied by a management plan which was developed between the FLRBG committee and the LCC staff. The plan is a comprehensive document to guide the management and development of the gardens over the next 5 years. Thanks are due to Vicki Currie, the waste facility education officer, for finalising the document and all the accompanying photographs.

On the day of the end of year party, we also opened the bridge over the gully in room 1. The construction represented many hours of work and some ingenious solutions to delivering materials to the site by our construction and maintenance team of retired tradesmen led by **Will Evans**.

We mourned the death of long-time volunteer and former Secretary of the Friends, **Denis Matthews**. It was a privilege to share the wake at the gardens with **Marie** and her family. As readers of the Newsletter will know, Denis was the inspiration for the Solar Clock, the labyrinth in the hoop pine forest and donated and supervised the installation of the bell near the labyrinth as well as contributing many ideas to the committee.

We continue to look for grant funding for the much-needed machinery and storage shed and workshop to be located adjacent to the driveway into the gardens. The shed will have solar power and a rainwater tank.

Planning has already begun for Botanic Gardens Week from 19 to 25th of May. We will have guided walks on the 25th and the visitor's centre will be open every morning during the week. The theme which BGANZ has chosen for the week is 'Guardians of the Green. Protecting Our Future'.

Vines are one of the first things that come to mind when we think of rainforests. They are a defining feature of rainforests and a vital part of their unique biodiversity, but they are poorly represented in botanic gardens and seldom included in revegetation projects.

Many vines are vigorous growers and can smother young trees. Exotic vines, such as *Madeira Vine*, *Cat's Claw Creeper*, *Balloon Vine* and *Morning Glory* are amongst the very worst threats to rainforest communities in our region. Native vines, however, are a different matter. Where they can be managed and contained, they should be part of our collection at the Lismore Rainforest Botanic Gardens.

About 170 species of vines grow in the various rainforest communities that occur within 200 kms of Lismore, our focus area for the gardens. Some are bushfoods or medicinal plants, many are important bird foods or nectar sources and host plants for butterflies and moths. Many have highly attractive flowers, fruit or foliage.

Our challenge now is to find ways to incorporate them into our rainforest gardens in ways that allow for easy identification while avoiding having them overwhelm our other plants. To this end, we have ordered ten garden arches to be installed at the entrances to the various rainforest rooms. We will also be using our fences as trellises. With appropriate signage, you will be able to appreciate and identify many vines that wouldn't normally be easily found.

Few nurseries cultivate any native vines (apart from some commercial cultivars), so they can be hard to obtain. As a botanic garden, we are committed to growing species type plants of known provenance. Commercial cultivars just do not meet our needs. If you have any stock of vines of local origin we would like to hear from you. If interested please email me at curator2@friendslrbg.com.au and I will send you our vines wish list.

### RICHMOND LANDCARE TAKES ACTION AGAINST FLOODING WITH NATURE-BASED SOLUTIONS

## SCIENCE IN THE PUB EVENT AT THE CHANNON TAVERN - 6 MARCH, 2025

Richmond Landcare Incorporated is leading a ground-breaking pilot project along Terania and Tuntable Creeks that aims to gather evidence to demonstrate that reforestation, as a Nature-based Solution, can be an effective option to reduce the impact of flooding and flood risk to downstream communities. The project focuses on enhancing flood resilience by restoring natural ecosystems, stabilising soil, and improving water management through the power of trees and vegetation.

To share the progress of this project with the community, Richmond Landcare is hosting a **Science in the Pub** event at the **Channon Tavern** on **Thursday, 6 March, 2025**, from **5:30pm to 8:30pm**. The event will showcase how reforestation can

play a role in reducing the effects of flooding, while also highlighting the importance of collective action in tackling environmental challenges. It will identify how local residents, landowners and Landcare groups can get involved and show support for nature-based solutions in the region. Attendees can discover ways to participate in community tree planting and follow-up maintenance days, or sign up for citizen science initiatives, including monitoring water quality and water bugs.

You are encouraged to arrive early, order some food and drinks, and get comfortable as the discussions kick off. Whether you're a local community member, landowner, or environmental enthusiast, this is a great chance to get involved and make a positive impact on the future of flood management in the region.

A sequel to the 1986 movie, *Labyrinth*, starring **David Bowie** as the *Goblin King*, is reported to be in the planning for release sometime in the near future.

Like other labyrinths in history and mythology, the movie labyrinth was a vast maze that had to be navigated, while avoiding dangers along the way.

The journey to the centre of the labyrinth represented a quest and a challenge that resulted in personal discovery and growth.

Walking a labyrinth offers opportunity for personal discovery and growth in the real world. It is a space in which to walk quietly, to move slowly, and to reflect deliberately on the things of most importance. (Alternatively, it can be a place to be loud, boisterous and animated.)

I suggest that before engaging with the labyrinth, to decide which order of things most needs attention at the time. I am referring to the four orders of reality described in the work of Margaret Archer, Professor of Sociology. They are:

1: natural,

2: practical,

3: social, and

4: transcendent orders.

Broadly speaking, we can identify the order that will be most helpful to address by asking the following questions of ourselves.

Do we need: to listen to ourselves, to our bodies, and to our connection to the physical world?

Or is it important: to gain clarity about our thoughts and questions, our plans, hopes and dreams?

Should the focus be: on our relationships and networks, and connections with others in our social context?

Finally, is it helpful: to reflect on, and open up to the transcendent order, beyond the natural world, through prayerful engagement in the labyrinth? The priority for reflection will differ between individuals and will likely vary between labyrinth engagements.

The Lismore Rainforest Botanic Gardens boasts a labyrinth high up in the hoop pine forest. It differs from the labyrinth of the movies in that it is a single path to be followed, rather than a maze to be solved.

This labyrinth is a gift to the community, and a place for questing that supports personal discovery and growth. And at the centre the adventurer is met by the tall textured trunk of one of the seven trees incorporated into its design: there is neither minotaur nor Goblin King.

#### MAKING A LIVING COLLECTION PLAN<sup>1</sup> FOR LRBG

The Lismore Rainforest Botanic Gardens are unique in Australia, and one of a very small number of Botanic Gardens around the world, that is entirely managed by volunteers and has an actively curated living collection of plants based on scientific value. We are very grateful to Lismore City Council for the land and financial contribution.

Recently we signed a new MOU and presented a new management plan to council. This plan emphasised that we are entering a new phase in the life of the gardens because most of the planting has taken place and we now need to turn our attention to ensuring our gardens fulfil the potential envisioned by the founders.

BGANZ has developed a *Living Collections Toolkit*, an online questionnaire that helps Botanic Gardens to develop a formal plan for their living collections. Once we have created the plan, we will be able to apply for Botanic Gardens Conservation International accreditation. This in turn will help with grant applications as well as support from other gardens and institutions.

A 'living collection of plants' is a group of plants grown for a specific purpose that is actively curated, recorded and displayed. The purpose of a living collection in a Botanic Garden is usually defined as Scientific, Social or a combination of both.

Collections with a social focus are based on educational, ornamental, social, cultural and local values. Examples in LRBG include the Sensory Garden and Useful Plants Garden. Scientifically based collections, such as the Uncommon Plants and the Myrtle Rust Research area, are focused on conservation and research. There are many areas in the Gardens that provide a combination of Social and Scientific value. The Rainforest Walk, for example, is a relaxing walk with many educational aspects as well as containing documented examples of our living collection.

There is a lot of work to be done to make the Living Collection Plan, including such things as accessing climate data, and we could do with some help. If anyone would like to volunteer, we would be most grateful.

I was privileged to represent the Lismore Rainforest Botanic Gardens at the 14th Australasian Plant Conservation Conference held from 13th to 17th October 2024 in Toowoomba. The theme of the conference was "From little things".

Major themes of the conference included:

- Navigating natural disasters
- Living on the edge the future for rare plants in Australia
- Northern connections saving Queensland's rarest plant species
- Fighting feral pathogens e.g. Phytophthora and Myrtle Rust
- Ex-situ conservation of threatened plants through meta collections.
- How to raise political and community awareness of threatened plants and the actions required to save them.
- Harnessing the power of citizen science for plant conservation.

Queensland Chief Scientist Professor Hugh Possingham spoke at the Conference dinner on "Making smart plant conservation decisions".

Guest presenter Costa Georgiadis did a highly memorable "T Shirt Presentation" resplendent in pink bib and brace overalls and a pink tee shirt, with pink

everlasting daisies (grown on the nature strip outside his home) in his beard. He produced a sequence of message tee shirts, all connected to his message of first connecting with people and only then conveying scientific facts once you have their rapt attention.

# TREE PROFILE - Peter Gould

ACKAMA PANICULOSA (Caldcluvia paniculosa)

Common Name:

ROSE-LEAVED MARARA, SOFT CORKWOOD

Family: **CUNONIACAEA** 

Ackama paniculosa is a medium to large tree growing to a maximum of 40 m in height and 1.0 m in diameter.

It is a common pioneer species growing on the margin of Subtropical, Warm Temperate and Cool Temperate Rainforests, sometimes persisting as a canopy tree. It may also be found in Wet Sclerophyll Forest at times. It occurs from Ourimbah, on the NSW Central Coast at 33° S to Eungella National Park in Queensland at 20° S.

#### Leaves

The leaves are compound, with 3, 5 or 7 oblanceolate or elliptic leaflets. The leaflets are opposite and regularly toothed with a terminal leaflet.

#### Bark

The distinctive bark is very corky, deeply fissured and pale fawn, giving rise to one of its common names "Soft Corkwood".

#### **Flowers**

The showy white flowers appear in Summer, in panicles 10-15cm long, terminal and in upper axils. The flowers are bisexual with 5 lobes about 1mm in length. There are 5 petals 1-2mm long and 10 stamens 4-8mm length and free. Filaments are of different lengths. The ovary is 2-locular and superior, the style c. 5mm long. The flowers have been used in floristry.

#### Fruit

The fruit is a globose capsule 2-3 mm long. They are red and occur in large numbers on terminal panicles.

Since 2013 Denis inspired or was involved in many projects. He created the Solar Clock and Labyrinth for the Gardens, always fascinated by maths and physics. He oversaw the installation of an old school bell in the Hoop Pine Forest. All of these features are now a focal point for visitors, young and old.

More recently, at events and workday morning teas, Denis was always the one to ask about the history of the Gardens and loved to tell a tale or two. His mind was constantly at work, suggesting ideas and projects.

Denis has left a wonderful legacy at the Gardens and we all miss him.

**Geoff Walker**'s retirement before Christmas from his position as a volunteer in the propagation nursery, has left a big space.

As a founding member of the Lismore Rainforest Botanic Gardens, Geoff has an in-depth knowledge of the history of the Gardens as well as plant propagation, and always a willingness to pass this knowledge on to others.

During his years working in the Nursery, Geoff was never happier than when he was engaged in a task and teaching others. Geoff will be greatly missed and we wish him all the best.

So, with reduced volunteer numbers, Rosemary, Pauline, Neil and I are very proud of the healthy young plants we are able to produce.

Apart from the everyday mundane work that needs to be done, we engage in some exciting and absorbing trials. Pauline, having harvested hundreds of kangaroo grass seeds conducted her own

experiment, setting out to ascertain the effect of smoke on the seeds in the germination process.

Following the tedious process of separating the tiny seeds from their husks, Pauline sprinkled half the seeds over the propagating mix in a seed-raising tray and placed the other half into a very fine gauze bag and exposed them to smoke, using a bee smoker that beekeepers use to pacify their bees.

Two to three weeks later, the results showed that the unsmoked seeds produced only 2 or 3 small seedlings, but the seeds that had been smoked before sowing using the same propagation mix, produced a crop of dozens of healthy seedlings ready for potting up into tubes.

We use reference books regularly in the nursery. Our most commonly used ones would have to be **Hugh** and **Nan Nicholsons**' *Rainforest Plants* series, and so we were delighted to receive a set donated by **Marie Matthews**. Thank you, Marie.
